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READ THE BIBLE IN TWO YEARS

Something you might like to use to extend your daily Bible reading.

The Bible is truly an extraordinary book, unique among all other books. It consists of 66 individual books, written by 40 different authors, in three different languages across 1,500 years of history. Yet for all of this diversity it contains a unified message that focuses on the coming of Jesus and the amazing salvation He offers through His death and resurrection!

The Bible contains words written by men in all the richness of literary types making it fun, challenging and enjoyable to dig into. Yet, at the same time, the Bible is also the very words of God given to us by His Spirit (1 Peter 1:21; 2 Timothy 3:16-17). These are not just words spoken in times past, but words that are alive for us to read today (Hebrews 4:12-13). The God of the universe actually addresses us today clearly in the pages of the Bible – amazing!

Jesus says the entire Bible points us to Him, that He is the focal point of it all. Listen to what He says, “He said to them, “This is what I told you while I was still with you: Everything must be fulfilled that is written about me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets and the Psalms.” (Luke 24:44). Or, again Jesus says, “You study the Scriptures diligently because you think that in them you have eternal life. These are the very Scriptures that testify about me, yet you refuse to come to me to have life.” (John 5:39-40).

Knowing this is helpful in motivating us to read the Bible regularly, to keep building a bigger understanding of God’s purposes and how they are being fulfilled in Jesus. To help with this, the Daily Reading Notes now include an extra challenge: to read the whole Bible in two years. It’s totally optional, are you up for it?

There is a list of around 15 chapters of additional reading for each week of the term that will help you achieve this challenge. These readings can be done on whatever days work best and in whatever order you prefer to read them. At the end of each term you have a chance to catch up before the next term’s suggested readings begin again. You can also track your readings across the two years right here. Enjoy!

INTRODUCTION

According to the opening verse, this letter was written by Simon Peter, who was one of Jesus' disciples from the very beginning (Luke 5:1-11). Some people have noticed that the style of writing in 1 Peter seems to be too advanced for a Galilean fisherman. It's likely that while Peter provided the content of the letter, it was penned by Silas, or he at least helped Peter (1 Peter 5:12). It was probably written before Pontus and Bithynia were joined into one region in 72AD, which could be why they're listed separately in 1:1. It also probably wasn't written as late as John's Gospel, or Revelation, as Peter doesn't seem to feel the need to deal with the kinds of heresies that popped up at those later dates around Jesus' humanity and divinity.

Peter's big goal is to see God's people recognise themselves as foreigners and aliens (1:1, 17 and 2:11). This language of "foreigners and exiles" isn't so much stressing the idea that we're looking forward to heaven as our real home, like Hebrews 13:14 does. Rather, Peter wants us to recognise that our pattern for living shouldn't come from the people around us. Abraham describes himself using the same words in the Greek version of the Old Testament in Genesis 23:4. He's not thinking vertically about heaven, he's thinking horizontally about how different he is from those around him. Don't just copy the way of life of those around us, Christ is the pattern for our lives. How do we pattern ourselves from Christ? Peter will show us the way.

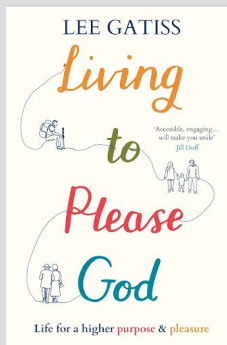
This Term of Daily Reading Notes

DAY 1

Read 1 Peter 1:1-9

The passage for this week is printed below. Circle or underline anything that seems interesting or important. Keep using this page as you go through the week.

¹ Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, To God's elect, exiles scattered throughout the provinces of Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia and Bithynia, ² who have been chosen according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, through the sanctifying work of the Spirit, to be obedient to Jesus Christ and sprinkled with his blood: Grace and peace be yours in abundance. ³ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶ In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. ⁷ These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸ Though you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, ⁹ for you are receiving the end result of your faith, the salvation of your souls. WEEK 1: 1 PETER 1:1-9

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 1:1-9 (again)

Think about this passage and the idea of inheritance. This letter was written to people who had little hope of earthly inheritance. See in verse 1, they're exiles, and they're scattered. Like refugees or migrants, exiles are people who've had to leave their lands behind. Their intergenerational inheritance had to be abandoned.

However, they're God's elect (verse 1). They've also been chosen by God (verse 2). They might have lost everything, but God has found them.

They've been given "new birth into a living hope" (verse 3). This "living hope" is living in several ways. It comes from Jesus' resurrection to life (verse 3). It is a hope that is alive in them because of their new birth (verse 3). It is also a hope that looks forward to a future life (verse 4).

It's not only that their inheritance is protected for them, but also that they are protected for their inheritance. All believers also share in the same two-sided protection. And what is the inheritance? It's "the salvation of your souls," from the end of verse 9.

What a great comfort this would have been to them from God. What a comfort it is for us. Despite our own fragility, even the fragility of our faith, God will make sure to bring us into our inheritance.

Prayer: Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! Take some time to pray.

WEEK 2: 1 PETER 1:10-12

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 1:10-12

Sometimes people try to separate the Old Testament (OT) from the New Testament (NT). They might do this by saying that the God of the OT was different. Perhaps he was all about rules, and earning your salvation. Then, in the NT, Jesus came and saved the day! But the NT doesn't see itself or the OT that way. Notice the links here.

The OT prophets spoke of God's grace, in verse 10. They spoke of God's salvation. And not a salvation earned by obedience. Peter is saying it was "Concerning this salvation" that the prophets spoke about. That's the salvation of verses 1-9: Grace, sanctification, election, great mercy, new birth, a living hope, imperishable inheritance, a salvation by faith, because of Jesus' death and resurrection.

In verse 11, you see that it was "the Spirit of Christ" who was in those prophets, predicting the sufferings of the Messiah. Christ was with them, in them, telling them about his future salvation. Surely it was a salvation that they too would be saved by. Christ isn't only spoken about in the OT, it's Christ himself who speaks in the OT.

Verse 12 shows you another OT-NT connection. Those prophets were serving us. We'd be the ones to see these things fulfilled. The same Spirit who was in the prophets, was speaking through the apostles and NT preachers. When they preached the Gospel, they were preaching the same salvation as those OT prophets.

Prayer: Praise God for his connected grace through all of salvation history.

WEEK 3: 1 PETER 1:13-2:3

DAY 1

Read 1 Peter 1:13-2:3

The passage for this week is printed below. Circle or underline anything that seems interesting or important. Keep using this page as you go through the week.

¹ 13 Therefore, with minds that are alert and fully sober, set your hope on the grace to be brought to you when Jesus Christ is revealed at his coming. 14 As obedient children, do not conform to the evil desires you had when you lived in ignorance. 15 But just as he who called you is holy, so be holy in all you do; 16 for it is written: “Be holy, because I am holy.”

17 Since you call on a Father who judges each person’s work impartially, live out your time as foreigners here in reverent fear. 18 For you know that it was not with perishable things such as silver or gold that you were redeemed from the empty way of life handed down to you from your ancestors, 19 but with the precious blood of Christ, a lamb without blemish or defect. 20 He was chosen before the creation of the world, but was revealed in these last times for your sake. 21 Through him you believe in God, who raised him from the dead and glorified him, and so your faith and hope are in God.

22 Now that you have purified yourselves by obeying the truth so that you have sincere love for each other, love one another deeply, from the heart. 23 For you have been born again, not of perishable seed, but of imperishable, through the living and enduring word of God. 24 For, “All people are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall, 25 but the word of the Lord endures forever.” And this is the word that was preached to you.

² ¹ Therefore, rid yourselves of all malice and all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and slander of every kind. 2 Like newborn babies, crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow up in your salvation, 3 now that you have tasted that the Lord is good. (NIV)

Prayer: Bring your reflections to God in prayer.

BE HOLY, FOR MANY REASONS

WEEK 3: 1 PETER 1:13-2:3

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 1:13-2:3

Another way that people sometimes drive a wedge between the Old Testament (OT) and New Testament (NT) is by attempting to drive a wedge between the Father and the Son. But see how impossible that is in these verses in 1 Peter.

First, holy living is motivated both from the future grace that the Son brings (verse 13) and the holy character of the Father (verses 15-16).

Second, live in fear of the Father's impartial judgement because you've been bought by the Son's precious blood (verses 17-19), which the Son spilled for you because the Father chose him to do this (verse 20).

Third, it's by having faith in the Son that you have faith in the Father (verse 21).

This connection is so inseparably close that Peter moves to the language of "word". A person's word is very close to who they are. Even more so with God whose word is the perfect communication of himself.

So, just as we were not purchased by perishable metals but the Son's precious blood (verses 18-19), and given new birth through the Son's resurrection (verses 3-4) into an imperishable inheritance (verse 4), we've also been born again not by any perishable seed, but by God's word (verse 23), which endures forever (verses 24-25).

Prayer: Praise the Father for the salvation we have from his Son, and praise the Son for the salvation we have from his Father. And don't sin.

WEEK 4: 1 PETER 2:4-10

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 2:4-10

Peter uses the technique of contrast here to show us how absolutely opposed people's responses to Jesus are.

The first contrast is in verse 4, and it's the contrast between humanity's rejection of Christ (the living stone), and God's delight in him as precious. It shows how deeply opposed we are to God.

The second is between those being built into the living building with that living stone (verses 5-6). They are called "those who believe" (verse 7). They are contrasted with those who don't believe, who reject Christ like a builder rejects a bad brick (verse 7).

The outcome is also a contrast, as for one group they'll never be put to shame because of this stone (verse 6), the stone is precious to them as he is to God (verses 7 and 4). To the other group, the stone will cause them to stumble and fall (verse 8).

These two "destinies" aren't random, but have been brought about by God (verses 8-9). The God of the Bible is a choosing, destining, deliberate God (1:2, 3, 15, 20, 23, 2:5, 8, 9).

The result of God's sovereign rule is the gathering together of people who were nothing into God's glorious people. God's sovereign rule means that his mercy is mercy all the way down to the depths.

Prayer: Praise God for his great mercy to us in Christ, which is in stark contrast to what we deserve for our rejection of him.

WEEK 5: 1 PETER 2:11-25

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 2:11-25

There are a whole range of motivations for holiness in the Christian life.

We're to be motivated by our own well being – sinful desires aren't good for us, they wage war against our soul (verse 11). God motivates us by our desire for his future glory (verse 12). God motivates us by our desire to see truth and goodness protected, as the ignorant talk of fools is silenced (verse 15). He motivates us by calling us to be who we truly are – free but not to sin, freely enslaved to him (verse 16). God motivates us simply by telling us what to do, as pure simple obedience (verse 17).

God motivates us by the intrinsic goodness of putting up with pain for God's sake (verse 19), in contrast with the justice of deserved punishment (verse 20). Again, God sees our suffering for his sake as precious. God motivates us by explaining to us that suffering is intrinsic to our Christian calling, because we've been called to follow Christ (verse 21-22). God reminds us that he judges justly; our unjust suffering is not the end of the matter (verse 23).

Most significantly, God motivates us by suffering for us. As an example, yes (verses 22-23), but not merely as an example. He suffered as our saviour. He suffered because of our sins not his own. He submitted to death to free us from our sins, and gave us a new life of righteousness. He was wounded for our healing. God motivates us by gathering us to himself. He wages peace against our hostile souls.

Prayer: Praise the Shepherd and Overseer of our souls.

WEEK 6: 1 PETER 3:1-7

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 3:1-7

This passage helps us see the equality and difference between men and women and some ways this is to be expressed within marriage. A similar passage you might like to read is Ephesians 5:21-33.

Verse 7 especially raises questions. It sounds quite blunt. Claire Smith's book helpfully highlights the way we can't just dismiss this passage as culturally time-bound. Her whole book is worth reading, and chapter 6 is incredibly helpful on 1 Peter 3:1-7. It helps us think more clearly about submission and obedience, what it is and what it is not (Claire Smith, *God's Good Design*). Though men and women are different, in a more important sense they are equal, created equal (Genesis 1:27) and equally heirs of eternal life (1 Peter 3:7).

Wives (and husbands), notice what true beauty is. Beauty and goodness are two sides of the same coin in God's world. Yes, nice hair, clothes, and jewellery can look nice, but true goodness is lasting inner beauty. Christ-likeness should be the aim for us all. This passage isn't a prohibition of wearing nice clothes, but it helps us think about the heart behind how we dress - there is much to think about and consider.

It's calling us to have our beauty come from somewhere else. Adorn yourself as the God-hoping women of the Old Testament did. True beauty never goes out of fashion in God's eyes.

There may still be questions, but there will be opportunities to think more in Church on Sunday and at a Hot Topics event on the 23rd of June.

Prayer: Pray for husbands and wives, men and women, for yourself and for others, that we would all obey these words from the heart.

WEEK 7: 1 PETER 3:8-22

DAY 1

Read 1 Peter 3:8-22

8 Finally, all of you, be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble. 9 Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult. On the contrary, repay evil with blessing, because to this you were called so that you may inherit a blessing. 10 For, "Whoever would love life and see good days must keep their tongue from evil and their lips from deceitful speech. 11 They must turn from evil and do good; they must seek peace and pursue it. 12 For the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and his ears are attentive to their prayer, but the face of the Lord is against those who do evil."

13 Who is going to harm you if you are eager to do good? 14 But even if you should suffer for what is right, you are blessed. "Do not fear their threats; do not be frightened." 15 But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, 16 keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander. 17 For it is better, if it is God's will, to suffer for doing good than for doing evil. 18 For Christ also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God. He was put to death in the body but made alive in the Spirit.

19 After being made alive, he went and made proclamation to the imprisoned spirits. 20 to those who were disobedient long ago when God waited patiently in the days of Noah while the ark was being built. In it only a few people, eight in all, were saved through water, 21 and this water symbolizes baptism that now saves you also—not the removal of dirt from the body but the pledge of a clear conscience toward God. Read 1 Peter 3:8-22

It is much easier to love sinful people when you realise that you've already won.

When you're wronged, how difficult is it to "be like-minded, be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble" (verse 8)? The temptation is surely to repay evil with evil. But Christ truly is the Lord. He is risen, seated on his throne, and will return to judge the living and the dead. He is at God's right hand – with angels, authorities and powers in submission to him. You have an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade.

If the one wronging you is an unbeliever, they're in terrible danger. They have, probably hidden deep down, an awareness of their own sin and God's coming wrath (Romans 1:18-20). Perhaps they're conscious that this life will be as good as it gets for them. But without hearing the Gospel, they'll have no sense that there is a period of amnesty, where there's a safe way to come to God. The way of grace and forgiveness.

So, remembering that Christ is Lord, be gentle. Be respectful. Love them, pray for them, and tell them that there's hope. Your hope is based on the same God that they're afraid to face. It's based on his mercy in Christ.

Prayer: God's ears are attentive to your prayers. Pray for God to forgive those who are mistreating you. Thank God for the Gospel of grace.

WEEK 8: 1 PETER 4:1-11

DAY 5

Read 1 Peter 4:1-11

See how closely Peter thinks we're connected to Christ. Since Christ suffered, we should have his mindset. Not because we've suffered, but because he has suffered. Because you have faith in Christ, you have suffered in the body – Christ's body! Therefore, since we're connected to the sufferer, we're done with sin. To live in sin now would be like being drunk. Unaware of our surroundings. Unaware of what's appropriate. Unaware of the time we live in.

The Gospel was preached before Jesus came. Again, Peter sees the rich connections between the Old and New Testaments. The faithful remnant of Israel, who died well before Christ arrived, believed in the Gospel. Some of them died in the wilderness. Some of them were killed by their own people. From a human perspective, they were judged by God. But, because of the Gospel of Christ, they're alive!

This world won't go on forever. Peter sounds like a crazy person, "the end of all things is near" (verse 7). But he's alert, sober, and sane. God is coming back, and everything he has planned will come to be, for the praise of his name through Jesus Christ.

Prayer: Pray that God's "Spirit of glory" would help you to suffer gloriously.

Consider how glorious Jesus' sufferings were.

He was oppressed and afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; he was led like a lamb to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. – Isaiah 53:7 (NIV, 2011)

³⁷Above his head they placed the written charge against him: *THIS IS JESUS, THE KING OF THE JEWS.* ³⁸Two rebels were crucified with him, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁹Those who passed by hurled insults at him, shaking their heads ⁴⁰and saying, "You who are going to destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! Come down from the cross, if you are the Son of God!" ⁴¹In the same way the chief priests, the teachers of the law and the elders mocked him. ⁴²"He saved others," they said, "but he can't save himself! He's the king of Israel! Let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. ⁴³He trusts in God. Let God rescue him now if he wants him, for he said, 'I am the Son of God.'" ⁴⁴In the same way the rebels who were crucified with him also heaped insults on him. – Matthew 27:37-44 (NIV, 2011)

What a blessing, to be insulted because of the name of Christ. How could we be ashamed to bear the name "Christian"? Yes, of course we're weak, but wow, we do have a faithful Creator.

1 To the elders among you, I appeal as a fellow elder and a witness of Christ's sufferings who also will share in the glory to be revealed: 2 Be shepherds of God's flock that is under your care, watching over them—not because you must, but because you are willing, as God wants you to be; not pursuing dishonest gain, but eager to serve; 3 not lording it over those entrusted to you, but being examples to the flock. 4 And when the Chief Shepherd appears, you will receive the crown of glory that will never fade away.

5 In the same way, you who are younger, submit yourselves to your elders. All of you, clothe yourselves with humility toward one another, because, "God opposes the proud but shows favor to the humble." 6 Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. 7 Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you.

8 Be alert and of sober mind. Your enemy the devil prowls around like a roaring lion looking for someone to devour. 9 Resist him, standing firm in the faith, because you know that the family of believers throughout the world is undergoing the same kind of sufferings. 10 And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. 11 To him be the power for ever and ever. Amen.

12 With the help of Silas, whom I regard as a faithful brother, I have written to you briefly, encouraging you and testifying that this is the true grace of God. Stand fast in it. 13 She who is in Babylon, chosen together with you, sends you her greetings, and so does my son Mark. 14 Greet one another with a kiss of love. Peace to all of you who are in Christ. (NIV)
